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- 1. In order to response the documents IRGN2197, IRGN2201, IRGN2203, IRGN2207, IRGN2208, IRGN2209 and IRGN2210R, CMEX held a meeting to try to solve the problem of inconsistent glyphs/fonts on April 17, 2018. Participants in the meeting include responsible personnel of relevant government departments. The conclusions of the meeting are as follows:
 - (a) Each responsible department has to check the glyphs/fonts they provided, and then reports the inspection results.
 - (b) If any CNS 11643 coded character need to be revised or any code mapping between CNS 11643 and ISO/IEC 10646 need to be changed, it is advisable to provide a code change table to facilitate the reference of the relevant government departments for using those Chinese characters.

2. Updating the <u>full repertoire of CNS 11643</u>:

the National Development Council (NDC) administrates the full repertoire of CNS 11643. The full repertoire consists of 19 planes with more than 100,000 characters right now. All of the characters in planes 1 to 7 and some of the characters of planes 12 to 15 are included in CNS 11643:2007. Besides, planes 8 and 9 contain some symbols came from ISO/IEC 10646, and planes 10 and 11 contain most of non-Tsource ideographs came from ISO/IEC 10646. The relevant government departments provide all characters in planes 12 to 15 and all characters in planes 19 are come from the Dictionary of Chinese Character Variants). The new full repertoire of CNS 11643 will be officially launched in June 2018. The new version will provide more comprehensive search functions and be replaced by responsive web design (RWD) to facilitate user access.

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
